Faculty Spotlight

["Faculty Spotlight," a regular feature of the ACM Newsletter, attempts to introduce one CS faculty member to our readers. -Ed.]

Our "Faculty Spotlight" this issue is on Assistant Professor Herbert Edelsbrunner. Professor Edelsbrunner earned his Diploma (equivalent to an M.S.) in technical mathematics from the University of Graz, Austria in 1980. He then went on to gain his Ph.D. in technical mathematics, also from Graz. His thesis topic concerned computational geometry. He also worked in a position at Graz similar to being an Assistant Professor during the latter work on his Ph.D. and a few years thereafter. In Spring 1985, Professor Edelsbrunner taught at the University of Denver before arriving here at the University of Illinois later that year.

Professor Edelsbrunner's areas of interest include data structures, algorithms, combinatorics, and discrete geometry. His goal is to work on mathematical aspects of computer science and to apply mathematical results to the solution of computer science problems. His book, *Algorithms in Combinatorial Geometry*, will be published this summer. Professor Edelsbrunner has also received the Amoco Faculty Development Award which funds his research.

Professor Edelsbrunner stated that he was inspired by the seminars of a certain professor at Graz, which made him especially interested in his present areas of concentration. He recommends that students maintain a certain degree of self-motivation and responsibility in their studies so that they too can expand their own interests into fulfilling careers.

Leadership Positions

The ACM is holding elections during the general meeting on Wednesday, April 1st. We will be accepting nominations for positions at each of the general meetings preceding the election meeting.

The positions available that will be decided by general membership vote are: Chairman, Vice Chairman, Treasurer, and Secretary. The responsibilities of these positions will be accepted by those persons who are elected to those positions immediately following the results of the elections.

The Chairman is responsible for the overall administration of the chapter, for performing public speaking to represent the chapter, and various and sundry other duties. If you are not prepared to work fifteen to twenty hours a week on this, do not even bother running for the job.

The Vice Chairman is required to obtain speakers for general meetings, to fulfill various duties as specified by the Chairman, and to fill in for the Chairman when necessary.

The Treasurer is responsible for handling all funds. This is a very important position, and requires a person of great honesty, one whom the executive officers can trust. Specifically, this job requires frequent trips to the bank with membership funds, fundraising activities, and bookkeeping of the organizational finances.

For Secretary, the position entails being responsible for all official correspondence, taking minutes at all executive and general meetings, and generally handling all chapter communications with outside agencies.

There are many positions that will be available by appointment. Appointments will be made on the basis of past performance (for currently active members), a willingness to work, and whether they are personable and competent. Some of the appointed posts are: Special Interest Group Coordinator, Social Chair, Publicity Chair, Newsletter Editor, Programming Contest Chair, SITE/JETS Coordinator, Engineering Open House Chair, Job Fair Chair, and Office Manager. Other posts are created and dissolved as needed.
